As you can see,in 2011 we have been asked to take in 786 animals compared with 656 in 2010 and actually took in 327 compared with 303 in 2010.

Even with our new facilities we are still having to turn animals away and that is not what we are about. Please, please, please help us to raise more money so that we can help those poor creatures who can't help themselves.

It is now just over a year since I left Sidlesham for my new home at Hayling Island. I live in a very nice house – warm and cosy in winter and cool in summer. Most of the surrounding gardens are bounded by six-foot high wooden fences and they make a super highway – almost an M25 for cats! In June 2004, we met **Eve Wise** at a Bognor Dog Show raising funds for Happy Breed. Sitting in Eve's car was a beautiful brindle Lurcher, named Ludo. Our Greyhound King George, fell in love with Ludo straight away and Eve arranged a home visit for us to adopt Ludo. The home-check was arranged and, thankfully, all went well. Ludo loved our cats and they got on well with him as he was so gentle with them. We were a happy family and enjoyed lovely walks and runs over the fields and visits to friends' homes – in particular, Ludo became friends with Billy, a little Yorkshire Terrier. Tragically, on February 7th 2008, we awoke to find that, overnight, dear Ludo had gone completely blind – he had detached retinas. He was rushed to our vets and then taken, by a pet ambulance, to another eye vet in Havant who tried for two days to save his sight but, sadly, without success. It has been a while now since Ludo lost his sight – it took him about nine months to become his old self again. Now, thankfully, being blind does not worry him anymore – he is a very happy dog again. He is ten years old now and enjoys his walks with us and his Auntie Jean, who looks after him when

we go out – she spoils him of course! He loves to get up to lots of mischief – his main "hobby" is getting into the fridge where, once, he stole a whole cooked chicken amongst other things! We forgave him even though it was everyone's dinner – ours, the dogs and cats. We now lock it for safety reasons!! We also have to remember to put the bin out as he would take everything out for us!

Eve, and her friend Roy, often visit and Ludo enjoys it every time we meet up. It is good for him – he loves everyone. To look at him, you would not know that he is blind. He is our best friend and always will be – he is our handsome boy. Although it was so tragic that this happened to him, he still enjoys life to the full.

We would like to thank Happy Breed for him – in particular, Eve, and also everything that she does for the rescue and for helping all the other dogs. Ludo would say "thank you" to foster "Mum" Eve, too, for finding him a new home with his "mate" George and his little pal Billy.

The Predictive Power of Incidences of Animal Violence for Human Tragedy

Animal abusers' tendency to commit violent acts against their fellow human beings has been well documented. Some of the more recent violence cases provide further support for recognition of the link between violence to animals and violent crimes against humanity:

- Raoul Moat, infamous for gunning down his ex-girlfriend and a police
 officer among others, according to news reports inflicted animal
 suffering and death by battering the family dog and a friend's cat.
- Stephen Barker, convicted for the killing Baby P- by inflicting multiple injuries, tortured guinea pigs and frogs and had a history of severe cruelty to animals.

 Thomas Hamilton, found guilty of the deaths of 16 Dunblane schoolchildren and a teacher, spent his youth intentionally running over rabbits with his car.

PETA UK have urged magistrates and law-enforcement officials to aggressively pursue and prosecute animal abusers, and have ALSO written letters to the editors of newspapers to inform the public about the animal-human cruelty link. Schools have been contacted in areas where cruelty cases have occurred to alert teachers of the importance of humane education, often with free learning resource teaching packs.

REPORT ANIMAL CRUELTY

Always report known or suspected cased of cruelty to animals to law-enforcement authorities immediately. Today's animal abuser could be tomorrow's murderer, rapist or serial killer

Update on Gregory now Grig.

Dear All,

I thought you would like to see recent pictures of my **Grig** (ex-**Gregory** the 3-legged tabby). He has really gained a lot of confidence and is able to relax with me and with my sister who often visits us. He is still nervous of loud noises and doesn't much like other visitors, especially men who come in with heavy



boots and loud voices. He still won't let me pick him up, but he comes to us readily to be stroked and enjoys being brushed – only on his back and under his chin though – not on his tum. He has several favourite dozing places around the house, and you can see how he now allows himself to go deeply

asleep – absolutely relaxed. He was on my bed when I took that photograph – that is one of his special places. He has learnt how to jump up there and come to wake me up in the mornings, patting – fairly gently – at what he can see of me.

We had an anxious few days at the weekend when he was obviously in



trouble with his remaining back leg. We managed – my sister with me on the Sunday – to get an appointment at Alphapet on West Meads, and he was surprisingly good when we got him there – frantic, of course, when putting him in the carry cage. The vet, a nice quiet

young man who used to treat my Fred, thought it could be a sprain or an infected puncture wound. He prescribed a pain-reliever and a course of antibiotics which worked well. By the Wednesday he was hopping about again quite happily.

He does go out in the garden and likes to sit in the sunshine, but does not really want to explore or go very far. He prefers to have company out there

and you can see that he likes to sit on the pieces of carpet that I use to kneel on when I am working. I have to do as much as I can on my knees these days as the old back as been giving me some trouble. I have neighbours with dogs on each side



now, large ones on the left and small yappy ones on the right. Grig used to at first run back to the kitchen when he heard them barking, but seems to realise now that they can't get in the garden and it doesn't bother him too much. I did notice though that when a rowdy party of young persons went by, shouting at each other, on the road behind the garden he was very frightened and came dashing in to hide. I think that he knows he is safe indoors.

He loves his food – I do find it a bit much when he wakes me up because he wants his breakfast at 5 or 6 o'clock in the morning. I have learnt to turn over and pull the bedclothes over my head and when he gets bored he goes further down the bed and curls up behind my knees, until a more reasonable hour. I give him mostly the various fish and meat products – in jelly as you recommended, topped up occasionally with the Wellbeloved dry food. We do have little treats now and again, and share a tin of pilchards, sardines or J. West red salmon - he likes the red better than the pink. Sometimes I poach a piece of white fish for us. It was fortunate that I had a piece ready when he was poorly – a nice fillet of sea-bass from Jordan's in Rose Green. He thought that was lovely and so did I.

It has taken a while for him to settle down. I have had him just over a year and it is really only in recent months that his behaviour has become so

much more relaxed and confident, but I think you can be sure that he is now on the way to forgetting the troubles of his feral past.


Ware & family for all coming along on the day and helping to raise much needed funds. We are going to use this money towards the new rabbit pens. Thank you everyone.
